

# BACK TO SCHOOL AGAMOGRAPH



**TWO PICTURES IN ONE**

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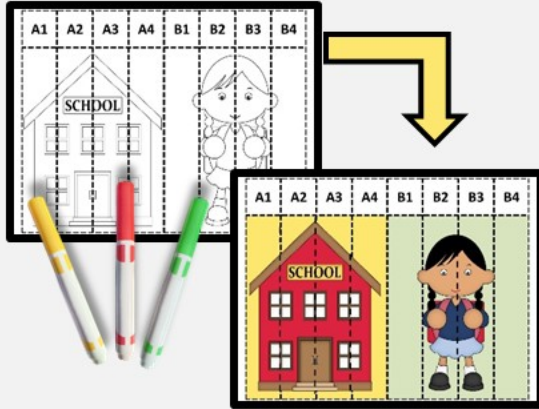
What is an Agamograph? It seems to have taken classrooms by storm! An agamograph is a series of images that change when viewed from different angles. This type of art is named after a sculptor, Yaacov Agam, who makes optical art.

The Back to School Agamographs I have made for you, give you two pictures in one. Students color the two pictures, cut the strips out and glue them to a fan folded background. Once the finished agamograph is sharply creased and stood on the table, students may look at it from different angles to see the 2 pictures.

I've given you directions with pictures but also suggest that you go on-line to find out more about this neat art project. You'll find videos giving more (and some slightly different) directions and some sites even have free printables.

You will find 2 Agamographs. Each have 2 school pictures. The directions are shown for only one. Each Agamograph has a colored version for you to use when modeling.

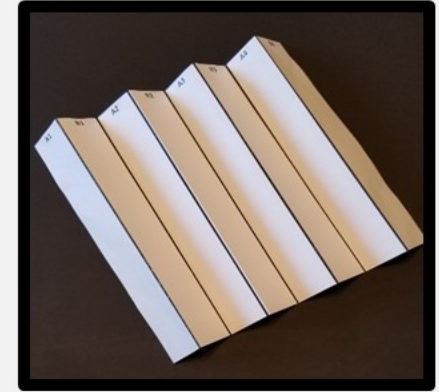
# Agamographs Instructions



1. Color the picture. The center dotted line divides the 2 pictures. Make sure the background is different for each picture.



2. Cut the white numbered background page. You will be using this to glue strips of your colored picture.



3. Fold the background page like a fan. Fold back and forth to the end. Make your creases sharp.



4. Cut out the pictures you colored. Cut them on the dotted lines. Make sure you leave the top part with the letters and numbers



5. Glue the strips of pictures onto the background. Each strip is labeled with a number and letter. Glue them to the background strip with the same letter and number.



6. When you have all the strips glued on, it will look like the picture above. Let it dry. Cut off the top with letters and numbers.





7. Make your folds sharp. I used a wooden stick to help crease each fold. Stand it up and look from the left and then look from the right. You should see a two pictures; one on each side. Please note, the photo above shows the 2 agamographs side by side.
